BE INFORMED

Emergencies, disasters, accidents and injuries can occur at any time and without warning. The time to plan for any type of disaster is before it occurs. We hope that you find the below and attached information helpful when creating your own emergency plan for your family.

Emergency Readiness Quiz...

1. Do you have a family emergency plan?
2. Do you know the emergency plan for work and/or school?
3. Do you have a disaster supply kit in your house?
4. Are your smoke detectors working properly and do your family members know how they function?
5. Do you have a meeting place outside your home if you must evacuate?
6. Are family and/or Co-op records and documents protected in a safe place?
7. Do you have contacts and/or family members to stay in other areas?
8. Do you know the numbers of local authorities and emergency services?
9. Do you know who your insurance agent is and his/her phone number?

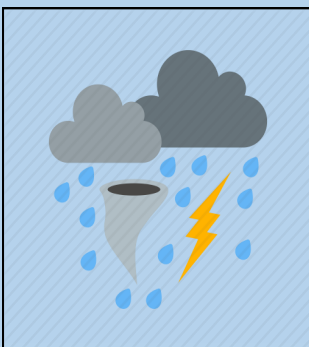
MAKE A PLAN. LEARN HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF AND COPE WITH DISASTER BY PLANNING AHEAD.

Tornado / Severe Weather Safety



Encourage your family members to plan for their own safety in many different locations. It is important to make decision about the safest places BEFORE you ever have to go to them. Make sure you have a meeting place outside your home if you must evacuate.

In the event of a tornado, the best place to be is in the basement away from a window. Put as many walls as you can between yourself and the tornado. Wherever that is in your home, make sure it is known by all family members.

If you and your family conduct annual emergency drills (fire, tornado, etc.), everyone will remember what to do and where to go when a tornado is approaching – automatically and without panic. Choose a friend or family member in another part of town or elsewhere to be a “contact person” that will be called by everyone should the family members become separated. If the building is severely damaged, evacuate the building as soon as possible after the storm has passed.

Remember to never put yourself in harm's way.
